



### Voice of Space: UFOs and Paranormal Phenomena October 17, 2025 – February 01, 2026



Voice of Space: UFOs and Paranormal Phenomena explores the profound mysteries at the intersection of human experience, belief, and the unknown, focusing specifically on UFOs and paranormal phenomena. As declassified government reports and an increasing media presence bring these topics into the spotlight, this exhibition examines the cultural, psychological, and metaphysical dimensions of these mysteries. What role do UFOs and paranormal phenomena play in shaping our understanding of the universe, and how do they challenge or expand our beliefs about humanity's place within it?

Through both contemporary art and historical works, the exhibition traces diverse artistic responses to these phenomena, drawing from religious iconography, psychological interpretations, technological advancements, and theories of inter-dimensional space-time. From ancient spirit drawings to speculative visions of the future, the show offers a broad lens on how humanity has sought to depict, interpret, and question the unknown, engaging with the ways in which these themes have influenced art, culture, and collective imagination over time. The project takes its title from a 1931 painting by René Magritte, which will be on view

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in the exhibition. *Voice of Space: UFOs and Paranormal Phenomena* will be accompanied by a fully-illustrated catalog featuring new scholarship by artist Paul Chan, curator Olivia Shao, and American science fiction writer and cultural critic Mark von Schlegell, published through The Drawing Center's Drawing Papers imprint.

### Ceija Stojka February 20 – May 31, 2026





In the early 1990s, when she was almost sixty years old, Roma artist, writer, and musician Ceija Stojka (1933–2013) began making art. Over the next two decades, she produced hundreds of paintings, drawings, illustrated books, and small sculptures based on her early life experiences. Born into an itinerant Roma family of horse traders in Austria in 1933, Stojka's early childhood was brutally disrupted by the German invasion in 1938, after which she and her family were deported to multiple concentration camps including Auschwitz, Ravensbrück, and Bergen-Belsen. Though Stojka survived along with her mother and siblings, her father and many extended family members perished along with hundreds of thousands of Roma during the Holocaust.

Comprising some 60-80 works, as well as a selection of sketchbooks, archival material, and documentary films made during Stojka's lifetime, this exhibition, organized by Lynne Cooke with Noëlig Le Roux, will explore the fullness of Stojka's production as a visual artist, centered in her Roma life and heritage.

Ceija Stojka is organized by Lynne Cooke, Senior Curator, Department of Modern and Contemporary Art, National Gallery of Art with independent curator Noëlig Le Roux and will be accompanied by a fully illustrated catalog featuring contributions by Cooke and Le Roux; Austrian-born, New York-based visual artist Ulrike Müller; and Dr. Ethel Brooks, Romani Professor of Women's and Gender Studies and Sociology at Rutgers University.
